Scoutmaster Minute

On Thursday night, July 20th, just two days before we were to go to Camp Mensinger, I found out the camp had been closed by the county due to a water supply problem. I was very disappointed, but also in a small panic. Twenty-five scouts and five leaders were ready to go to summer camp, something they had been planning for almost a year. I immediately started calling friends and associates I had made through my many years of scouting and almost immediately we were accepted at several camps including Camp Royaneh, Camp Marin-Sierra, and Camp Winton. Many years ago I had vowed to stay away from Golden Empire Council Camps, but I decided it was time to bite the bullet and give Winton a second chance. I notified the leadership and called an emergency meeting to discuss our change. Everyone was understanding and flexible with our last minute rearrangements in plans. Not a single complaint was mentioned and everyone seemed to roll with the new plan. For this I will be so ever grateful, thanks to all parents and scouts for being so understanding.

Our trip and arrival at camp was pretty uneventful. The staff was small in number, but they seemed to have a determination to make things work. We had to bring our own tents to camp since the council does not provide the canvas for troops. The tent platforms are cracked and coming apart and scoutmasters labored all week to replace the broken ones. Changes in schedules were dealt with and the week started with some last minute adjustments. Program area directors, commissioners, and even the camp doctor were teaching classes. I worried if they would all collapse from exhaustion from being so understaffed. Even though the cooking crew walked out on Tuesday, camp went on. A bunch of us pitched in and helped cook meals until the new cook and staff could arrive. We woke up at 4:30 in the morning to cook for 250 hungry scouts, scouters, and staff. The commissary staff is non-existent so we prepared our own cobbles and outpost meals for ourselves. This turned out to be a real plus for all of the troops, since we got the run of the supply room. They don't have a truck in camp so we volunteered to haul three dumpster loads of trash to the top of the hill on an unforgiving dirt road. Do you know how bad week old garbage

smells (don't forget this was during the heat wave)? Big Red and Big John have replaced the two and three hole latrines I experience in 1989, but the odor is more memory making. The once picturesque lodge looks like it may fall off its foundation and the trading post is about to collapse. Yes our council seems to run under the same model it did in 1989, the last time I attended a GEC camp, but something magical happened at Camp Winton during our week at camp. To my surprise, my week at Camp Winton was full of positives. These 20 or so young people showed the dedication, enthusiasm, energy and scout spirit to give our guys an experience they never will forget. They were not about to let this under-maintained camp get the better of them. I will always remember the crazy skits at campfire, flags, and before meals presented by these zany young men and women. They sang, danced, and played their way into the hearts of each of us. I will forever remember the closing campfire and the standing ovation the camp gave the staff and the genuine tears that rolled from some of their cheeks as they said goodbye knowing they had done their best. It reminded me something my father told me when he was a scout leader, "It is not the facility that makes a camp, it is the people who make the camp." Thank you Camp Winton staff for a wonderful week!

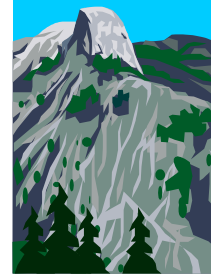
Troop Golf Night – Thursday, August 17, 2006 Bradshaw Ranch Golf Course

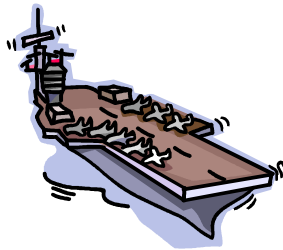
Webelos Woods Staff Needed! September 29 – October 1, 2006

Mt. St. Helena – Rim of the Bay Hike Saturday, December 2, 2006

The next segment in our Rim of the Bay Hike series will be earned by climbing Mt. St. Helena, north of the Napa Valley. **Jimmie Garcia** will be coordinating our hike to the top of this 4,200 foot peak. At the top you will get a spectacular view of the Napa Valley and area around the peak.

For those of you who are new to the troop the San Francisco Bay Area Council promotes the Rim of the Bay Series Hikes. Six bay area mountains are designated to be hiked by the council. The mountains include Mission Peak (Fremont), Pinnacles National Monument (Hollister), Mt. Diablo (Concord), Mt. Wittenberg (Point Reyes National Seashore), Mt. Tamalpais (Marin), and Mt. mountain peaks that make up the series. Each time a scout hikes to the top of one of these mountains he earns a segment for the series. On the first hike the troop presents the scout with the large center patch shown above. Scouts who complete all six hikes are placed on our Rim Rover Plaque. We sometimes incorporate a camp out with some of the hikes. We have done all the hikes 5-10 times over the past twenty years. Parents and adult leaders can earn the patch and segment too. Another big fundraiser will be starting soon for the troop!!! Many of you are familiar with Trails End Popcorn which the Scouts have been selling for many years. This is a great way to earn money for you son's scout account. 34% of each scout's sales goes into their scout account. We are hoping all

the Scouts will participate in this fundraiser this year so the troop will get even a bigger percentage, which will mean an even higher percentage for the boys. There are other incentives as well; if they sell \$1,500 they will get a gift card of their choice from Trails End. If they sell \$2,500 they will receive a scholarship, which keeps gaining in interest until they go to college. The troop will also have prizes and recognitions. September 11: Take orders information and order sheets will be given out at the troop meeting

October 9: Last date to turn in orders

November 4: Popcorn orders can be picked up at the Ruygt's

November 6: Popcorn will be at the troop meeting to be picked up

November 13: Last day to turn in popcorn money (we suggest collecting money as you sell)

Speaking of Girl Scouts did you know that for each box of cookies they sell they get approximately fifty cents! With Boy Scouts for every popcorn item they sell, over 72% goes to the local Boy Scout councils which then share it with the units selling!!!

Magazine Sales: Scouts can sell magazine subscriptions. Scouts earn 50% of their total sales. Just think a one year subscription to Time magazine runs about \$50.00. Out of that \$50.00, the scout will receive a \$25.00 credit for his scout account. This is a simple fund raiser and scouts can earn lots of money by just selling to friends and relatives. This project has already started. See **Chris Ishikawa** for the order form catalog.

Entertainment Books: Scouts can sell Entertainment books that contain discounts for restaurants, hotels, movies, entertainment, sports, and hotel accommodations. Scouts earn \$8.00 per book. See **Chris Ishikawa** for Entertainment Books.

See's Candy: During the winter month, See's candy is available in two ways. One is by selling candy bars. Scouts

make 50 % on the bars. We also have take orders for special holiday items. This year we will offer Christmas, Valentine, and Easter Candy by order. Look for these fund raisers when **Chris Ishikawa** gets the order forms.

Elk Grove Harvest Festival (October), **SMUD Picnic** (August), **Elk Grove Western Festival Parade** (May): These community events are also fund raisers for our troop. Scouts and family members participating in these events earn credits by putting in hours. Some of these projects earn large credits for scouts. Our troop has a great reputation for being hard working and reliable and we are asked back over and over again.

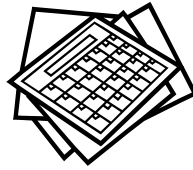

Christmas Tree Recycling: We have been recycling Christmas trees in the Rosemont area for over ten years. This year we will be distribute fliers, announcing our Christmas tree pick up on December 26, 2006. We will be picking up trees on December 30th, January 6th, and January 7th. We will need parent help. If you have a pick up or trailer it would be greatly appreciated. Scouts and parents divide the money earned by the hours spent on this project. We have earned up to \$5,000.00 on this project in the past.

The only exception to this is if the Troop Parent Committee approves the funds to be spent on other events (i.e. National Jamboree).
