If you are a Life Scout, or a Star Scout nearing the Life rank, please start thinking about a plan to attain your Eagle rank. It's never too soon. Because an Eagle Scout Service Project must be approved by the Scoutmaster, troop committee and the Rio del Oro District before it can be carried out, there is quite a bit of lead time involved. You should allow at least three months from project concept to final approval before the project can be carried out. After the project is completed, another month should be planned for completion of the service project workbook and application.

If you are thinking about an Eagle Scout Service Project, please talk to Don Dier about your ideas. He's the troop's advisor for Eagle Advancement and will assist you with putting your proposal together for presentation to the troop committee. The project cannot be carried out without Scoutmaster, committee and district approval. If you don't have any ideas for a project, Don can help with that too. There are many good Eagle project ideas waiting to happen.

## Youth Protection

The BSA has come out with a stricter Youth Protection policy, it is as follows:

Effective June 1, 2010

- Youth Protection training is required for all registered volunteers.
- New leaders are required to take Youth Protection training before they submit an application for registration. The certificate of completion for this training must be submitted at the time application is made and before volunteer service with youth begins.
- Youth Protection training must be taken every two years. If a volunteer's Youth Protection training record is not current at the time of re-charter, the volunteer will not be reregistered.

We would like everyone to retake the youth protection if you did not take it in the last year (since June of 2009). Also please take the course not just the test, they do make changes in the course and it would be a good idea to keep current. Don't forget to print two copies of the certificate, one for your records and one for the troop records.

While you are on the web site take any other courses that interest you (work on getting the whole collection) and bring me copies of the certificates.

Scouts are not limited to the Troop resources. They can undertake Merit Badges whenever they want and this includes the historical ones. If there are no Troop 380 Counselors available, then the Scout can find a counselor that has signed up with the Golden Empire Council.

This summer the troop will not have specific merit badge classes. Classes will resume in the fall. Scouts are encouraged to take advantage of new merit badge opportunities at summer camp and finish / complete any outstanding requirements on badges that they may have only partially completed. The Rio Del Oro District will no longer exist after the August 12, 2010 Roundtable. After 40 years, part of RDO will merge with the River City District to form a new district, with a new name and new boundaries. Units in Folsom will join the El Dorado District. So beginning in September we will be part of this new district. Roundtables will change location to the LDS Church at 3001 Wissemann Drive, off of Folsom Blvd, beginning



with the September 9, 2010 Roundtable. Chris Ishikawa will continue as Roundtable Commissioner and most of the staff will be moving with her. River City District includes much of the city of Sacramento and West Sacramento. The new district will have a total of 62 units. The leadership for the new district will be made up of present district leaders who will co-facilitate committees and projects. The new district committee is looking forward to the challenge of a new beginning and forming new friendships.

During an initial meeting with the two districts, Ricci Dula, our district executive, presented names that had been suggested for the new district. A preliminary vote was taken and the names were narrowed down to the following:

At the August Roundtable a vote will be taken on the five finalists. Each unit will get one vote and the unit must be represented at the Roundtable. We will discuss Troop 380's vote at the June Roundtable. After the decision is made the district patch and logo will be adopted.

We say a fond farewell to our district. Troop 380 has been a strong contributor to the success and organization of the Rio Del Oro District. The name will change, but the spirit will live on.

The show lasted for about 90 minutes. There was a drum and bugle group from SFBA Troop 12, a couple rap hip-hop artists, acrobats, a military band and a very good slideshow. During the show, Robert Mazzuca (BSA's Chief Scout Executive) addressed the crowd. Mr. Mazzuca told the group about the future of Scouting. Then Mr. Mazzuca and the event committee introduced Stephen Bechtel. Mr. Bechtel's foundation is donating \$50 million to help prepare the new National Jamboree site called The Summit: Bechtel Family Scout Reserve in Glen Jean, West Virginia for the 2013 National Jamboree will be held there.

We were all surprised with Golden Empire received an award the 3<sup>rd</sup> best council gateway. What an honor for having only two units attend the great event.

After the show was over, the group returned to our campsite to wind down. Some went to bed while others went over to look through the telescopes again.

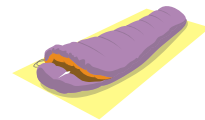
