Welcome to our newest Scouts and parents! Most of you have already been introduced to our finance system, but we thought a review for everyone would have some benefit.

The treasurer's table is staffed by myself and my assistant, Joan Stretars. Both of us had Scouts in the troop some time ago, and have been in the troop many years. The table is open from 6:40 to 8:30 at all meetings, excluding courts of honor. If you need to pay for anything, please do so during those times. If you plan to pay when you pick your son up, make sure you come early to do so. At 8:30 we are ready to go home like everyone else!

Our troop does lots of fundraisers to help offset your Scouting costs, and they can be used to pay your dues, campouts, clothing, or anything else within the troop. Per troop policy, dues and adult recharter fees are automatically taken from any credits in your account. Also, if you have any campouts, activities or summer camp payments that were not paid when due, we will take them from your credits also. If you are trying to save your credits for a particular event, like a High Adventure trek, you will need to make sure you pay your other amounts due on a current basis.

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We track over 75 accounts and process about 250 transactions a month, so it makes it very difficult for us to remember who wants to save credits and who does not. There is no place in the computer to note this. We will try to do our best to accommodate you, but please don't get upset with us if it is used somewhere else. If we do use credits in your account for something and you prefer to pay for it, by all means, just give us the repayment and we will recredit your account. No harm done!

If you are signing up for an event and want to use your credits, or want us to apply credits to summer camp or another activity, you need to come tell us! We will give you a receipt showing the credits applied.

We welcome all questions and inquiries as to account balances. We don't have a printer at the meetings, but are happy to go over the account with you if you would like.


Capital City District Spring Camporee


