

For four days at the end of July, Andrew, Ian, Chris, Brian, Ben, Christian and Austin, along with my daughter Emily, trekked 24 miles down the Lost Coast trail. These scouts met the challenge of hiking in one of the most remote coastal areas of California. Along the way, we saw an abandoned lighthouse, bear tracks, beautiful sunsets, beach cliffs, sea lions, maybe a dolphin or two, and enough rocks to last a lifetime. The hike was a unique, ankle-testing experience. Instead of climbing over glacier-polished Sierra granite and fighting the effects of altitude, we often hobbled from rock to rock, keeping an eye out for tides and waves that continuously eroded and polished the cliffs and beach rocks. I want to especially thank the adults who went on this trip, Wei, Ben, Paul, Dave, Mike, and Dan, as their driving and supervision made this trip of a lifetime possible.

National Jamboree

On July 11, 8 scouts from Troop 380 along with about 100 other scouts from the Golden Empire Council, departed in the wee hours of the morning to the East Coast. For four days scouts enjoyed sightseeing in many famous cities and locations in the hot and humid weather. Some stops included Independence Hall in Philadelphia, the Capitol building in Washington D.C., and Little Round Top in Gettysburg, PA. Scouts enjoyed their time in fancy hotels and exquisite meals at various restaurants.

On the day of 15th, scouts arose early to board buses and head to the new Jamboree Site, the Bechtel Summit Scout Reserve near Mount Hope, WV. All camping gear was provided for, and after setting up in what would turn out to be the hottest day at the Jamboree, scouts embellished in their first night of patch trading. For the

next week and a half, scouts strolled on around the huge site and participated in numerous activities, including downhill mountain biking, skateboarding, and shooting sports. Jamboree exclusive events included the white water rafting, canopy tour zip lines, and the Big Zip, a freakishly long $\frac{3}{4}$ mile zip line. The troop containing our scouts, Troop D124, participated in troop events such as opening and closing arena shows, a technology quest, a day of service, and a trek day up to the summit of the Summit. Finally, after two weeks of fun and adventure, the tired (but clean) scouts flew home and arrived late in Sacramento, where they could get a real long night's sleep.


New Hogan Reservoir Service Project **October 5** **by Ben H.**
