EAGLE WATCH

Congratulations to Evan Frenklak and Charlie Potter on passing their Eagle Scout Board of Review. They are the troops 135 and 136 Eagle Scout.

After becoming an Eagle Scout, the Scout may receive an Eagle Palm for five additional merit badges they have already completed or earned. They also must be active in the troop and patrol for at least three months, demonstrate Scout spirit, demonstrate leadership abilities, have a Scoutmaster Conference and Board of Review. The Eagle Palms are Bronze Palm (five merit badges), Gold Palm (10) and Silver Palm (15). Congratulations to Ian Chang on receiving the Bronze Palm.

Preparing to be an Eagle Scout begins when you join the troop. Keep all rank cards, merit badge (blue card) cards and other award certificates and badges in a notebook with plastic card holders, like those used for baseball cards, or protective sheet covers.

Life Scouts can begin working on or preparing to present a proposal for an Eagle project at any time. However, it is highly recommended they and their parents attend a district Life-to-Eagle presentation, held prior to the districts



monthly Roundtable in March, July and November, to get a good understanding on what is an Eagle project and the steps on becoming an Eagle Scout.




Philmont is Calling
