Troop 380 maintains a comprehensive collection of pictures from each of our events and activities. For the past year and a half we have maintained digital photos exclusively. During a recent dust bunny roundup I came across several photo binders and vinyl photo pages I had purchased several years ago for future use. The binders were free with the purchase of so many pages. Little did I anticipate the impact of digital photography. So, I've got the binders for free for anyone who might want one or two (most say Troop 380 on the cover, some say Summer Camp and a year) and the pages for sale at a discount. Let me know. I'll have some samples tonight.

Mike Kuykendall is in charge of the troop digital camera and makes sure that it is assigned to the Scout in charge of each event. In addition, anyone attending an event is welcome to take their own pictures. It would be greatly appreciated if copies of the pictures could be given to me as soon as possible after the event. Pictures can be put on a CD or one of the USB flash drives I have available for your use. If you like, you can bring the card from your camera and I can transfer the pictures at a troop meeting. If you know you are going to be taking pictures at an activity, just ask me for one of the USB drives ahead of time, copy the pictures onto it and return to me at the next troop meeting. All I ask is that as you take pictures at an event, try to include as many members of the troop as possible in a variety of shots.

I maintain an indexed collection (by event) of digital troop photos. Many of them are posted on our website, which is maintained by Joe Pearce. Because of space limitations, not all photos make it onto the website. Currently there are over 10,000 pictures in the troop's digital collection. So far this year we have close to 2000 pictures.

Each January, CDs with all the digital pictures from the previous year are made available for a nominal charge. In order to put so many pictures on one CD, the size of each photo file is reduced significantly. For most applications, this file size isn't a problem. However, if you need any file(s) in their original size, just let me know. At any time during the year, any available pictures may be requested, such as for an Eagle Court of Honor. 
NYLT

Northern Tier High Adventure – Summer 2008 By Dave Ishikawa

During the summer of 2008, three crews from Troop 380 will travel to Northern Minnesota to participate in an adventure of a lifetime. Each crew of eight will be made up of scouts 13 years and older and adult leaders. The Boy Scouts of America own and operate a canoe outfitting service and base that scouts attend from all over the world. These scouts and their leaders canoe the Boundary Waters Area Canoe Wilderness in Northern Minnesota and Quetico Park in Canada. Each crew will select a route and canoe for ten days in the wilderness. The crews will see bald eagles, moose, beaver, and bear. They will hear coyotes howling at night, pick wild blue berries, see ancient Petroglyphs on rock walls, listen to thundering waterfalls, and view some of the most picturesque lakes in North America. Two of our crews will base out of Ely, Minnesota, at the Charles Sommers Canoe Base. One of our crews will travel into Canada to Atikokan, Ontario Province and canoe to Sommers Canoe Base, over 100 miles. This will be an adventure you will never forget. All crews are currently filled, but you can put your name on the waiting list. We are also talking about an adult only crew. The adult crew will hire a private outfitter for the trip and travel at the same time as our scout crews. All crews will travel to Minneapolis and St. Paul for a tour of the twin cities before or after the canoe trip. And of course we will visit the huge Mall of America and its

famous indoor amusement park. Please see me for more details. The conditioning begins this summer.
