
Troop Pictures By Don Dier

It would be greatly appreciated if copies of the pictures could be given to me as soon as possible after an event. Pictures can be put on a CD or one of the USB flash drives I have available for your use. If you know you are going to be taking pictures at an activity, just ask me for one of the flash drives in advance, transfer the pictures onto it and return to me at the next troop meeting. All I ask is that, as you take pictures at an event, your attention be on all the members of the troop and not just your son.

I maintain an indexed collection (by event) of digital troop photos. Many of them are posted on our website, which is maintained by Joe Pearce. Because of space limitations, not all photos can be placed on the website. Currently there are over 15,000 pictures in the troop's digital collection. In 2007 we added over 4900 pictures.

CDs with all the digital pictures from the previous year are made available for a nominal charge. In order to get so many pictures on one CD, the size of each photo file is reduced significantly. 
Mt. Wittenberg Scott Ripkie

Summer Camp(s) 2008

Troop 380 scouts will have the opportunity to attend not one, but two summer camp this summer. Scouts and parents will need to sign up for one or both camps as soon as possible to secure a spot at camp. Deposits are already due. Please read more to find out about each camp.

Our primary summer camp will be at **Camp Chawanakee**, on Shaver Lake. Dates for this camp are June 22-28, 2008. Camp Chawanakee is one of the most outstanding facilities in California. The program offers COPE, climbing, horseback riding, nature, scout craft, handicraft, water sports, rifle and shotgun shooting, and much more. Camp Chawanakee is operated by the Sequoia Council. The food at the camp has been outstanding. The fee for this camp is \$340.00. A \$50.00 deposit is now due to hold your spot at camp.

Our second camp this summer will be at the Golden Empire Council's **Camp Winton**. Dates for this camp are July 20-26, 2008. Camp Winton has just received some major renovations and should make our camp experience much better. The program at Winton offers water sports, shooting sports, nature, scout craft, handicraft, and much more. The fee for camp is \$285.00. A \$50 deposit is due as soon as possible.

We will be hosting a special Summer Camp Meeting on Monday, February 4th, to discuss details about each of these camps. All scouts attending camp and a parent are asked to attend. This meeting will follow the Webelos Open House that same evening.

Philmont Scout Ranch 2009

Philmont Scout Ranch is one of the outstanding experiences for scouts. Located in Northern New Mexico, Philmont provides the opportunity for scouts to backpack for twelve days in the Rocky Mountains.
