The merit badge session will be scheduled as follows:

Some merit badge counselors may not need all sessions to complete the merit badges. Other merit badges may require other sessions or field trips to complete.

Matt's project was a beautification project along a highly traveled portion of Keifer Blvd., not far from where the troop meets. It involved clearing the area of trash and weeds and the planting trees and shrubs. An irrigation system was also installed. The project required coordination with the County of Sacramento, SMUD, the Sacramento Tree Foundation and several adjacent homeowners. Look soon for an invitation to Matt's Eagle Court of Honor.

Will Vance is finalizing his Eagle Scout application, having completed a great project at the Elk Grove Senior Center. Alistair Fortson received approval from the troop committee on March 25 for his Eagle service project, which is to build 18 four foot long wooden benches for his school, Country Day School. He will be asking for your help, so please do your best to assist.

If you are a Star Scout and nearing Life, or have recently attained Life, please start thinking about a plan to attain your Eagle rank. It's never too soon. Because an Eagle service project must be approved by the Scoutmaster, troop committee and the Rio del Oro District before it can be carried out, there is quite a bit of lead time involved. You should allow at least three months from project concept to final approval. After the project is completed, another month should be planned for completion of the paperwork and application.

If you are thinking about an Eagle service project, please talk to Don Dier about your ideas. He's in charge of Eagle Advancement for the troop and will assist you with putting your proposal together for presentation to the troop committee. The project can not be carried out without Scoutmaster, committee and district approval. If you don't have any ideas for a project, Don can help with that too. There are many good Eagle project ideas waiting to happen.

Troop Pictures **By Don Dier**

Troop 380 maintains a comprehensive collection of digital pictures from each of our events and activities. Mike Kuykendall is in charge of the troop camera and makes sure that it is assigned to the Scout in charge of each event. In addition, anyone attending an event is welcome to take their own pictures. It would be greatly appreciated if copies of the pictures could be given to me as soon as possible after an event. Pictures can be put on a CD or one of the USB flash drives I have available for your use. If you know you are going to be taking pictures at an activity, just ask me for one of the flash drives in advance, transfer the pictures onto it and return to me at the next troop meeting. Or, you can bring the card from the camera to a troop meeting and I can copy the pictures on the spot. All I ask is that, as you take pictures at an event, your attention be on all the members of the troop and not just your son.

The troop's digital camera was recently damaged and required replacement. The troop committee approved the purchase of a new camera. I mention this as a reminder that digital cameras are very sensitive and should be handled with care.

The troop maintains an indexed collection (by event) of digital photos. Many of them are posted on our website, which is maintained by Joe Pearce. Because of space limitations, not all photos can be placed on the website. Currently there are over 15,000 pictures in the troop's digital collection. In 2007 we added over 4900 pictures. We are in the process of revising our troop website so that all the pictures can be accessed in a variety of sizes. The new site will be located at t380.org. It is still under development, but the basic structure is there. Please visit it and provide feedback on its development.

CDs with all the digital pictures from previous years are made available for a nominal charge. In order to get so many pictures on one CD, the size of each photo file is reduced significantly. For most applications, this isn't a problem. However, if you need any file(s) in their original size, just let me know. The venturing crew has been busy working on a few fun things the last couple of months. In February we, as a crew were working on our “climbing” elective. As part of this elective, we sponsored an evening at Granite Arch which included 25 scouts from the troop and crew, 15 scouts from Troop 394 and 5 scouts from Troop 94. We enjoyed 2 hours of a challenging course which force all the scouts to work together as a team to be able to complete the course. The course included climbing on the rock walls, wooden vertical walls, tubes, rope swings, non-parallel piping and a few other obstacles. If the scouts wanted, they had the opportunity to rappel a 30’ wall. We will sometime in the near future be going to an outdoor location for some more climbing. March found us starting to work on “Shooting Sports” elective. Venturing is different from Boy Scouts in that we can also shoot hand guns. We had an NRA Certified shooting instructor come to one of our meetings and present a course on gun safety with the emphasis on hand guns. During this course, we were able to learn how to safely load the guns using “dummy” rounds and also how to safely verify that the gun was not loaded.

Much of the Venturing Program revolves around having “consultants” come in and teach the skills to the Venturers. For climbing, I was able to find a council certified climbing instructor to teach the skills. I was also successful in finding a BSA acceptable consultant for the gun safety course. At this point, I could use some help locating someone who is certified by the NRA as a certified range officer so that we can complete this item by being able to shoot for accuracy. Please let Joe Reynolds know if you happen to know such a person.



Mission Peak By Greg Bringedahl



Chawanakee is owned and operated by the Sequoia Council headquartered in Fresno. Troop 380 has been to Chawanakee three times. It has become one of the troop's favorite camps. The programs and offerings are excellent and the facilities are

some of the best on the West Coast. Chawanakee features one of the most challenging COPE courses the BSA has to offer, an outstanding waterfront (canoes, kayaks, sailboats, rowboats, and swimming), climbing (a huge climbing wall), horsemanship corral, field sports (rifle, shotgun, and archery), nature center (with many merit badges and trails), craft area, and great meals provided in an indoor dining hall. Also featured are outstanding outpost experiences and first year camper programs. The lakeside setting makes this a great camp. Please sign up as soon as possible if you would like to attend. Fees for the week are \$340.00. A brother discount of \$25.00 is available. Space is limited so see Dave as soon as possible if you would like to add your name to the list.

Camp Winton: Our second summer camp for the summer will be at Camp Winton, on Bear River Reservoir. Camp Winton is operated by our own Golden Empire Council and is located in El Dorado County, near Highway 88. We will be attending Camp Winton from July 20-26, 2008. Camp Winton is a little more rustic than Camp Chawanakee or Camp Royaneh, but is unique in its own special way. Programs include an outstanding water front program, nature center, craft corral, scout craft, field sports, and outdoor dining. The Tribe of Winton program will have scouts wanting to return for future summers at this wonderful lake camp. Camp fees are \$279.00. No brother fees are available. All fees are due by April 28th. Erik Carlson will be scoutmaster for our week at Camp Winton.

Both Camp Chawanakee and Camp Winton: All scouts and leaders must have a current medical examination form filled out and signed. Medicals are due two weeks prior to the camp you are attending. Both camps also require special release forms for the taking of photographs, participation in shooting sports, and medical emergency treatment. Space is limited for both camps so act soon if you want to go to summer camp. We will need drivers for both summer camp sessions. Please see Dave or Erik if you can help.

Northern Tier Trip By Dave Ishikawa

Twenty-four scouts and scouters have been preparing for a very special trip to the lakes and streams of Northern Minnesota and Ontario, Canada. On July 14, 2008, our crews will head to Northern Tier. Northern Tier is made up of three high adventure bases in Minnesota and Canada. One of our three crews will canoe from Atikokan Canoe Base, in Ontario, across the Quetico Provincial Park, and arrive at the Charles L. Sommers Canoe Base, near Ely, Minnesota. Our second crew will travel in the opposite direction from Ely to Atikokan. These crews will cover over 100 miles on water and portages. Our third crew will travel in the Boundary Waters Area Canoe Wilderness and Quetico Park. All three crews will tour Minneapolis and St. Paul, the wonderful "Twin Cities," before heading to the canoe bases. Highlighting the touring will be the famous Mall of America, touring the Twin Cities, and possible stops at the International Wolf Center or Soudan Mine. The guys have been training for months for this special trip. They will be paddling for ten days in some of the most remote wilderness areas in North America. Each scout and leader has been fine-tuning their canoeing skills, camping techniques, and portaging muscles. Summer Camp 2009 By Dave Ishikawa

Once again, during the summer of 2009, Troop 380 will be attending two summer camps. We will be attending Camp Royaneh during the week of June 21-27, 2009 and Camp Cherry Valley during the week of July 19-25, 2009.

We have been attending **Camp Royaneh** since 1987 with breaks to attend Camp Oljato, Camp Chawanakee, and Camp Makualla. Camp Royaneh is one of our favorite summertime destinations. It is owned and operated by the San Francisco Bay Area Council and is located near the Russian River, near the coastal town of Cazadero. Royaneh is full of history and tradition and is one of the oldest camps West of the Mississippi. It is famous for its COPE Course surrounded by a redwood grove and its fantastic Diamond R Horse Corral. The pool at Royaneh is a favorite for typical hot afternoons. The Baden-Powell program is an excellent beginning for first year campers. We estimate the cost for Camp Royaneh will be approximately \$325.00. Camp Cherry Valley will be a very special trip. Camp Cherry Valley is owned by the San Gabriel Valley Council in Southern California and is located on Catalina Island. The

cost of the camp is pricy so save your dollars and participate in troop fund-raisers. This years cost for Cherry Valley for camp fees alone were \$470 for Out of Council scouts. We will be taking deposits (\$50.00) after May 1st on a first come, first serve basis. We are limited to 20 scouts and four leaders. The trip cost will also include a visit to a Southern California Amusement Park and at least a one night additional stay. We estimate the total cost for this trip will be around \$600.00. 2009 Philmont Expedition

Twelve lucky Troop 380 scouts and adults will be traveling to Philmont Scout Ranch, in New Mexico, from June 25 to July 10, 2009. Philmont is the Boy Scouts of America High Adventure Base located in the Northern mountains of New Mexico. Philmont is one of the most sought after Boy Scout experiences in the nation. Philmont offers horseback riding, burro racing, climbing, mine camp experiences, mountain man camps, shooting rifles and shotguns, fly fishing, all while backpacking over 50 miles of scenic backcountry. Ryan Allen, Mark Woosley, and Gerry Goodie plan on leading the expedition to this scouting paradise. Each year Philmont conducts a lottery to determine which scout units get to send crews to Philmont. Troops cannot send crews in consecutive years. Often times the waiting list will go 2000 crews deep. Scouts must be 14 years old when attending Philmont or 13 and completed the 8th grade. Troop 380 crews have traveled to

and from Philmont via AMTRAK. This part of the trip is an adventure in itself. Look for more details soon.

2010 Centennial National Jamboree

Fort A.P. Hill will be the destination for the biggest celebration in Boy Scout History, the 100th Anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. During the summer of 2010, over 35,000 scouts and leaders from all over the United States and many foreign countries will gather in Caroline County, Virginia for the National Jamboree. The Golden Empire Council is now in the process of forming eight provisional troops of 36 scouts and four leaders each to travel to this special event. The formation of these troops will be specifically for the Jamboree and will meet separately from Troop 380. Scouts will also tour for 6 to 8 days before or after the Jamboree. Sights will include Washington DC, Mt. Vernon, Gettysburg, Williamsburg, Jamestown, and Monticello. Details will follow soon. Adult leaders will also be needed. The registration process will be a two step process. Applicants will need to register on the national level on line and with the local council by filling out an application and paying a deposit.
