In 1969 I attended my first National Jamboree as a scout. It was one of the most memorable events I have ever participated. I was one of the 35,000 scouts and leaders. While attending the Jamboree, Neil Armstrong, landed on the moon. I had the privilege of meeting astronaut, Frank Borman, one of the first astronauts to orbit the moon. Mr. Borman showed a film of Armstrong's first historic steps on the moon; to an arena show of over 50,000 people just days after the event had happened. I also listened to Lady Baden-Powell tell us about her late husband and the meaning of scouting. I met hundreds of scouts from all over the United States and all over the world. I made friends with many scouts on that trip to Farragut State Park, in Idaho. I have been lucky enough to attend six National Jamborees in my life. They are truly incredible events. Please consider going to what promises to be the biggest event in Boy Scout history, the 2010 National Jamboree, at Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia. It will be an event you will never forget.

Troop 380 maintains a comprehensive collection of digital pictures from each of our events and activities. Mike Kuykendall is in charge of the troop camera and makes sure that it is assigned to the Scout in charge of each event. In addition, anyone attending an event is welcome to take their own pictures. It would be greatly appreciated if copies of the pictures could be given to me as soon as possible after an event. Pictures can be put on a CD or one of the USB flash drives I have available for your use. If you know you are going to be taking pictures at an activity, just ask me for one of the flash drives in advance, transfer the pictures onto it and return to me at the next troop meeting. Or, you can bring the card from the camera (CF or SD) to a troop meeting and I can copy the pictures on the spot.

As our collection of troop pictures continues to grow, it becomes more important that an effort be made to sort and edit them a bit before submitting to me for posting on our website. Please take a moment to cull out any pictures that are not web worthy, such as those that are blurry, over/under exposed, repeats or just plain duds. Your assistance is greatly appreciated.

The troop maintains an indexed collection (by event) of digital photos. We also have all pictures posted on our website, located at t380.org. There are currently over 25,000 pictures posted. The pictures are presented in three resolutions. The first, and smallest, resolution makes quick viewing easier. The second resolution is good for seeing more detail. The third, and highest, resolution is best if you want to print a picture. Yes, you can copy the pictures into e-mails and print them at home if you like. Please take a look at the entire website. We're always looking for ways to improve it. If you have any thoughts or comments, good or bad, forward them to the webmaster, whose address can be found on each page.

CDs with pictures from the previous year are made available each January for a nominal charge. In order to get so many pictures on one CD, the size of each photo file is reduced significantly. For most applications, this isn't a problem.

Report on Merit Badges By Bob Williamson

One of the reasons that Troop 380 has over 100 Eagle Scouts is that there is a troop focus on the importance of the lessons learned on the Trail to Eagle. This path includes the development of knowledge, the practice of leadership, and successfully completing a series of steps. At least 21 or these steps are merit badges that each Eagle Scout must earn. Our goal in the Troop 380 Merit Badge program is to offer counselors for at least 2 of the required merit badges for the fall, winter, and spring sessions. That means that there are 6 different badges that a scout could select from each year. It also means that a scout who does all of the work, should be able to complete his merit badge requirements in 4 years or less.

The summer group of merit badges, photography, mammal study, and cooking are just about complete. An extra thanks to our merit badge counselors Jon Traum, JimBuell, and Don Dier. For the Fall 2008 session the Troop is offering Personal Management (R), one of the Citizenship Badges (R), Reading and one other badge. These merit badge meeting will take place on October 6 & 20, November 3 & 17, and December 1 & 15.

Troop 380's new OA candidates, Angel Echevarria, Casey Reynolds, and Aaron Rush completed their requirements by attending their Ordeal weekend at Camp Winton. At the beginning of the summer, I completed the requirements to become a Brotherhood member, the next level after becoming an Ordeal member.

Also, Jim Garcia and I joined about 600 other OA members from across the country for a week long service project at the Shasta-Trinity National Forest, north of Redding. ArrowCorps5 was 5 different service projects at national parks this summer. 19 OA members from the Golden Empire Council attended in July and cleared and repaired over 50 miles of hiking trails near Mount Shasta. This included work on the Pacific Crest Trail that goes from the Mexican border to the Canadian border. The crews also cleared over 22 tons of illegal dumping from the park.

Mt. Lola Mini Trek By Zach Burgess

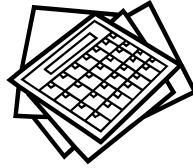

Approximately 43,000 scouts and leaders from all over the United States and the world will gather for an eight-day event at this historic military base. The Jamboree will feature amazing arena shows, a huge merit badge midway, action centers, a gigantic aquatics area, fishing pond, art and science competitions, military exhibits, national exhibits, gateways, and fellowship with scouts from all over the country and the world. Scouts wishing to participate in the Jamboree can go by signing up to be part of the Golden Empire Council's contingent. The council contingent will form eight troops to travel to and from the Jamboree. Travel will include a tour of Washington DC. Scouts will visit the White House, U.S. Capitol, Smithsonian Museums, National Archives, Mt. Vernon, Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, Viet Nam Memorial, Arlington Cemetery, and much more. 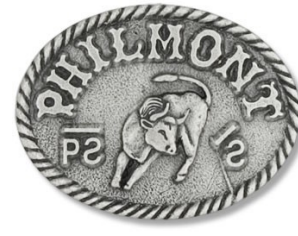
