#### Fair Oaks Cemetery Service Project May 26

On Memorial Day Weekend

Troop 380 will be doing their annual service project at the historical Fair Oaks Cemetery on Olive Street in Fair Oaks. On the morning of Saturday May 26 when the cemetery holds its Memorial Day Service the Scouts will gather at 8:45 AM to start directing traffic, handing out programs and taking part in the flag ceremony during the service. This year's theme is honoring military chaplains in memory of the 75th anniversary of the "Four Chaplains." On Feb. 3, 1943 four Army chaplains gave their lives to save others when the U.S. Army Transport Dorchester was hit by German submarine U-223 while transporting 902 servicemen, merchant seamen and civilian workers. The ship was hit below the water line with

a torpedo, initially killing and wounding many men on board. Lt. George Fox. a Methodist: Lt. Alexander Goode, a Jewish Rabbi; Lt. Clark Poling, a Dutch Reformed minister; and Lt. John Washington, a Roman Catholic Priest, acted quickly to calm the men and distribute life jackets. When they ran out of life jackets, the four chaplains removed their own and gave them away as well. As the ship sank, the chaplains could be seen, arms linked. on the deck, and heard, singing hymns and offering prayers. Along with honoring all

veterans who have served our country highlights of the service will include a guest speaker, Congressman Bera and other dignitaries, bagpipers, buglers and music. After the memorial service the troop helps take down the chairs and awnings. In the afternoon we will return to the cemetery at 3 PM to take down the Avenue of Flags. Early Monday morning, May 29 at 7:30 AM, we return to the cemetery to put up the Avenue of Flags, returning in the afternoon to take down the flags. This is the 12th year that the troop has done this large service project which the Scouts enjoy because of the moving ceremony, interesting headstones, the beautiful rolling hills and the gratitude they receive from the public. Scouts can earn either community service credit for their rank advancement or a stipend for their Scout account. There are four time slots Scouts can sign up for. #### 24th World Scout Jamboree July 21 to August 2, 2019

The 24th World Scout Jamboree will take place at the Summit Bechtel Scout Reserve in West Virginia from July 21 to August SCOUT JAMBOREE SCOUL

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2, 2019. Participation is open to eligible youth (age 14-17), unit leaders (18 and older) and International Service Team members (aka Staff. 18 and older).

How is a World Scout Jamboree different than a National Scout Jamboree? The WSJ is different than National Jamboree's in many ways including:

The focus at the World Jamboree is more on meeting people from different cultures and countries than doing high-adventure activities. While you will have plenty of opportunities to zip-line, ride mountain bikes and take advantage of the adventure programs at the Summit, you will also have many opportunities to meet new friends and learn what Scouting and life are like in other countries.

The World Scout Jamboree has unique programs for participants to learn about different cultures, sustainability, peace and community service. These

activities are intended to give participants an opportunity to learn new things and to build new friendships.

Additionally, most National Scout Organizations have both men and women participants, so about half of the WJ participants are girls and women.

#### Who can attend the World Scout Jamboree? If

you want to attend as a participant, you must be between the age of 14 and 18 (born between July 22, 2001 and July 21, 2005 (no exceptions). Adults over the age of 18 can serve on the International Service Team (IST) and as unit leaders. All partici-

pants, unit leaders and IST must be members of the Boy Scouts of America. The WSJ Contingent is open to all Boy Scouts and Venturers who meet the age requirement.

In addition, Scouts must meet the physical requirements for attending the Summit Bechtel Reserve, found on the Summit Health Form.

#### **USA Contingent Cost?**

The participant and unit leader fee includes registration for the Jamboree, meals at the Jamboree, tents and patrol and cooking gear. The fees also cover appropriate travel expenses (including food) between "Hub Cities" and the Jamboree. An appropriate number of "Hub Cities" will be identified across the continental United States depending on the distribution of youth and leaders that make up the various units. Applications will be responsible WE WORLD'S Finest. WECRISE for the costs to

get themselves to and from these "Hub City" locations. There will not be pre or post touring in order to keep the cost down and allow more participants to this once in a lifetime opportunity. Western region fee is \$2,800.

The IST fee will include all of the items noted about except for transportation and travel related expenses. Transportation to and from the Jamboree will be the responsibility of the IST member based on when they need to report or depart from their staff assignment. The World Jamboree Organizers (Host) will provided transportation to and from a limited number of Gateways to the jamboree site. Those Gateway locations are identified as Yeager Airport in Charleston, WV, Charlotte/Douglas International Airport in Charlotte, NC, the AMTRAK station in Prince. WV, and the Ruby Welcome Center in Mt. Hope, WV. IST Fee is \$1.800.


